# “Rejoicing in the Lord”

“Rejoice in the Lord always, and again I say rejoice!”

For some time now, I have made a practice of answering people who customarily ask me, “How are you?” With a response that is not traditional, I answer them by saying, “I am rejoicing in the Lord!”

It has been very interesting to hear the comments people have made to me when they hear me say this to them. A few have said, “I am too.” Others simply state, “That’s good.” Others to whom I have said this to on previous occasions, have said in a nice way, “I know you are.”

The good thing about my saying this to others is that I get a positive response from those who reply to me after I tell them, “I am rejoicing in the Lord.” The follow up to this is that I make a practice of asking them how they are and this has opened the door to me in some situations to talk to them more about the Lord. Many of us are asking the Lord to give us an opportunity to witness to others. I have discovered that my sincere practice of greet-

ing others, as I have stated it here, has helped to give me a door of opportunity to people I have come in contact with. In fact, some of the people I see again that I have told that I was rejoicing in the Lord, will tell me that they know how I am, “that I am rejoicing in the Lord.” I agree with them by saying, “You’re right.”

The New Testament has rich teachings on the subject of rejoicing. In the book of Philippians in chapter 4, verse 4 we read: “Rejoice in the Lord always, and again I say rejoice.” My favorite verse on this Christian expression of joy and testimony is found in 1 Thessalonians 5:16, where it is stated: “rejoice evermore.” I have found in my Christian life that this practice of rejoicing in the Lord and giving thanks in every thing in Christ gives me a different attitude to live by. “In every thing give thanks: this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you.”

(1 Thessalonians 5:18)

Of course, it is not that every thing that happens to me or anyone is something we like or enjoy. It is my way of exercising faith in the Lord, to let Him know that I trust Him and know that everything He allows to come into my life is for good reason according to His divine wisdom and that He will personally direct the results in His own perfect will. “...him (God) who worketh all things after the counsel of his own will...” (Ephesians 1:11)

It is a blessing that Christians do not have to live trusting in chance happening, otherwise known as good or bad luck, but that our living Lord has promised to “...work all things after the counsel of his own will.” Therefore we rejoice greatly in the assurance that our God will not leave us as victims of chance happening but will work out all things according to His divine wisdom. Let this teaching in Ephesians 1:11 be an ongoing understanding of peace in your heart that our gracious Lord has made full provisions for the welfare of your life, including those areas of life in which we are not able to control. “But my God shall supply all your need according to his riches in glory by Christ Jesus.” (Philippians 4:19)

## Inspiration and News of the ECA’s Military Chaplains

Fallujah, Iraq - Maj. Kenneth Sorenson, 2nd Bct 1st Cav Div, has traipsed through the Iraqi desert fully armed-though he carries no firearms, no ammo.

“I feel very safe,” he said. “I’m confident in the Lord and confident in the soldiers’ ability to protect me.”

As chaplain for the Fort Hood-based Black Jacks Brigade, Sorenson supervises six chaplains and serves the several thousand or so men in their unit. His current assignment placed him 10 kilome-

ters outside of Fallujah in early December, a few weeks past their scheduled departure date for home.

“Soldiers are good at taking things in stride,” said Sorenson, ordained with the Evangelical Church Alliance. With heightened combat against insurgent strongholds, the unit’s homecoming was placed on hold.

“Going into Fallujah; that was pretty intense,” Sorenson -who was commissioned in 1990 and spent the Persian Gulf war in basic training

stateside-said in a telephone interview from his desert camp. “I’ve heard a lot of great stories about God protecting soldiers going into the city.”

One of the most compelling reports, Sorenson said, was made by another unit which had come under attack by rocket-propelled grenades, gunfire and tracer rounds, while trying to rescue a disabled tank. Five soldiers had to dismount their own tank to assemble a tow bar to the broken vehicle.

“Not one of the five soldiers was wounded at all,” he said. “They said it was just incredible to be there and experience that.”

Sorenson gives much of the credit for such examples of providence to stateside Christians who have been faithfully interceding on behalf of the Marines and soldiers stationed in the Middle East.

## “My Father’s Business” Keeping Your Church Out of Legal Trouble

A volunteer youth instructor leaving a Montana church slipped on a sloped, icy sidewalk. She landed on her head and neck and damaged her spine. The instructor sued the church for failing to put salt on the ice and handrails on the sloped sidewalk. The jury awarded her \$402,000. This is not an isolated case. Churches are frequently sued by people injured on church property. Often these are “slip and fall” cases—where a visitor slips on an icy sidewalk or wet floor. Injuries also arise when neighborhood children play on church property, and when volunteer workers fall during building repairs.

Other common claims against churches include clergy malpractice, sexual abuse and harassment, breach of fiduciary duty, discrimination, wrongful discharge defamation and invasion of privacy. Lawsuits are brought by visitors, neighbors, volunteer workers and even church members and employees.

Once such lawsuits against churches were considered scandalous. Now they are seen as routine—as business transactions for financial compensation. The result, though, can be a legal judgment in an amount so large that the

church financially collapses.

For some claimants, the knowledge that a church has liability insurance further reduces the psychological barriers to litigation. “I am really suing the insurance company, not the minister” is a common refrain.

The end result, though, is simple: Churches now face the same basic legal exposure as a small business. Even if there is liability insurance, the damage can be substantial—churches still face the prospect of public scandal that can ruin their reputation and end the pastor’s career.

What does this mean for pastors, lay leaders and others responsible for the church’s solvency and reputation? Fortunately, most lawsuits can be prevented easily. Simple procedures will stop most legal claims before they start.

To illustrate this claims-prevention approach, let us examine lawsuits for accidents and injuries. These are the most common legal claims against churches. And as shown by the Montana case at the beginning of this article, the damages can be onerous. Here are seven simple steps that will eliminate

most such claims:

1. Promptly shovel snow, and put salt and sand on icy walks. The courts are somewhat lenient for slips on freshly-fallen snow, where the hazard is obvious. But courts are tough when snow and ice sit for days without correction.

2. Promptly mop wet floors. Again, courts will be lenient for a new hazard, such as water tracked in during a church service. They are more severe, though when water is allowed to sit for hours without being mopped.

3. If slippery conditions cannot be immediately corrected, place warning signs. A person’s knowledge of a risk will usually prevent a lawsuit. Give your greeting crew brightly colored warning signs to place on slippery floors, sidewalks and parking lots.

4. Use precautions if neighborhood children play on church property. A common lawsuit is for “attractive nuisance” - when children are drawn to “attractive” hazards on the property, such as tents, ramps and playground equipment. Either erect a fence around these features or place warning signs.

5. Carefully supervise all repair activities. Churches can be sued by volunteers injured while fixing the building. Frequently this happens when a person falls from a ladder or roof, and those injuries can be severe. The simplest solution: have a professional builder train and supervise all volunteers.

6. Have an attorney do a quick “preventive law” check. A competent lawyer can walk through the building, talk to you and immediately spot the major legal hazards. He or she will prepare a short letter identifying the needed claims-prevention procedures and possible insurance coverage problems. Cost will be between \$500-1500, depending upon the size of

the church.

7. Purchase a Commercial General Liability insurance policy. While this will not prevent lawsuits, it will cover most claims for accidental injuries. The insurance company will pay for a lawyer to defend you and will pay for all covered judgments. Verify coverage, though, for volunteers and independent contractors.

In conclusion, lawsuits against churches, pastors and lay leaders can be costly, scandalous and stressful. It is far better to avoid them by using preventative law!

## Have You Ever Considered Putting the ECA in Your Will?

As a 501 (c)(3) charitable, nonprofit organization, the Evangelical Church Alliance depends on donations for supplemental funding. Each year, thousands of individuals designate a portion of their assets by bequest to benefit charities. As a matter of fact, bequests have become an important part of the American philanthropic tradition because they enable individuals to make significant gifts that they may not have been able to make during their life.

Bequests can include specific assets, such as stock, and bequests can state a specified dollar amount. A residual bequest designates all or a portion of whatever remains after all debts, taxes, expenses, and all other bequests have been paid. A contingent bequest takes effect only if the primary intention cannot be met. For example, you might wish to leave a bequest to a certain individual; but, if that person does not survive you, then the bequest would go to your charity. This ensures that property will pass to the charity rather than unintended beneficiaries, including the government.

While most people own some form of life insurance because of its unique ability to meet a variety of needs for financial protection, its role in planned charitable giving is frequently overlooked. Life insurance itself can be the direct funding medium of a gift to the ECA, permitting the donor to make a substantial gift for a relatively modest annual outlay. If you would like to leave a bequest to the ECA or name the ECA as a beneficiary of your life insurance, talk with your estate planner or attorney. This might be an avenue that would allow you to make a substantial investment in God's work long after you've received your eternal reward.
